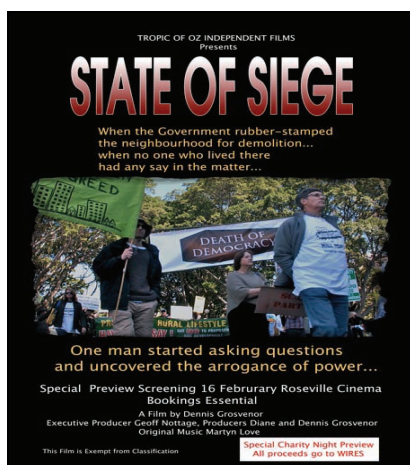

“PLANNING ANGER.....‘THE GOVERNMENT’S PLANNING POLICY IS UNDER SIEGE’ ”

A recent report conducted by the Environmental Defender's Office concluded that the public *“has lost all confidence in the planning system, which favours developers and has concentrated planning powers in the hands of the minister.”* The Report, funded by the Nature Conservation Council of NSW and the Total Environment Centre, found that the planning system has become so complex, politicised and dysfunctional that a complete overhaul is needed. The Report said that *“reforms since 2004 to ‘cut red tape’ and ‘streamline the development assessment process’ were clearly linked to the (developer) industry lobbying.”* It concluded that the Labor government’s reforms produced a system that gave priority to short-term economic growth, ignored or played down environmental impacts, and marginalised public input.

North shore houses more

THE state government has approved a plan for 4500 dwellings in six north shore suburbs. The Planning Minister, Tony Kelly, gave the green light to the Ku-ring-gai Times Centre Local Environmental Plan which will reveal where apartment and commercial developments will be located in the district when it is released today. The plan will pave the way for development of about six heavy near railway stations. Small strip shopping centres will be transformed into "town centres" at Roseville, Lindfield, Goslen, Pyralde and Tarramunga. It is also likely to be included as a future town centre in the plan for the district's development over the next few decades. Another 5000 new dwellings have already been approved. Mr Kelly said the total of 10,000 extra dwellings planned for Ku-ring-gai was "substan-

tially less" than the average of 15,000 dwellings across most Sydney council areas as part of the government strategy to house an extra 1.7 million people by 2036. Residents of the garden suburbs on the north shore have campaigned hard against the plan, arguing it is an overdevelopment that will see the destruction of up to 700 heritage homes. They say the rail line and Pacific Highway are at capacity and the new houses will choke the area. Mr Kelly said 14 new heritage conservation areas would protect valuable properties and the plan would preserve the character of most of the municipality. "Facing the necessity of new dwellings in existing town centres, close to public transport and other services, also means that the remainder of the local government area will retain its existing character," he said. Ku-ring-gai, is tragically a testimony to the Environmental Defender's Office Report's findings.

Ku-ring-gai is where damaging overdevelopment has and, without drastic counter steps, will continue to destroy natural and built heritage; where democracy has been denied by the installation of the Minister's Planning Panels; where thousands upon thousands of petitions and submissions, including reports from experts, have been ignored or been met with Ministers' factually incorrect responses, half truths, and misleading statements; where there has been a reduction of services as dwelling numbers increase; where it is a virtual impossibility to effectively widen the major through road, the Pacific Highway, to cope with Sydney's increased traffic; where the cost of duplicating the rail line up the North Shore to Hornsby is prohibitive; where the State Government has approved plans that are inconsistent with the stated objectives and definitions of their own documents; and where, no matter how many compromises were made by Ku-ring-gai Council and residents, the planning "goal posts" were continually changed by the State Government. ► In light of the Environmental Defender's Office Report's findings it comes as no surprise that Ku-ring-gai residents are asking for a total review of and a limit to the number of new dwellings being foisted upon them. In Ku-ring-gai's case, a cap of 6,000 dwellings has been put forward – the projected target to be reached in the Municipality by the State election in March 2011. It also comes as no surprise that there have been calls for a Royal Commission into planning in this State.

Ethical Issues in Planning

From time to time, political vindictiveness is evident in the planning system in NSW. In the case of the NSW Government's urban consolidation policies, Ku-ring-gai has been treated differently to other Council areas. Unlike other local government areas in NSW, Ku-ring-gai Council was not allowed to develop its own housing strategy consistent with the stated objectives of the Government's Residential Housing Strategies namely strategies which are '*tailor made to local areas and backed by high levels of community consultation.*'

In addition, the Minister for Planning refused to gazette local environmental plans adopted by Council to provide statutory protection of the urban conservation areas in Ku-ring-gai which have been identified by the National Trust of Australia as being of National significance.

Furthermore the Council and residents of Ku-ring-gai have been forced to accept a new Town Centres Local Environmental Plan even though LEP 194 gazetted in 2004 already provided the 10,000 additional dwellings required by the Metropolitan Strategy.

The gazetted plans are designed to change the character of the area without regard to the national significance of the heritage conservation areas or the national significance of the vegetation.

However the greatest evidence of political vindictiveness is the lack of good will of the State Government towards the Ku-ring-gai community which would have to be one of the greatest examples of discrimination evidenced in the planning system in NSW.
