

Turramurra Heritage Walk

Turramurra's village precinct is unique. It is a collection of Federation and interwar streetscapes and 'gardenesque' publically-OWNed carparks. They are all within walking distance of some of Australia's finest 20th century domestic architecture and some of Sydney's rarest urban forests — critically endangered Blue Gum High Forest.

This heritage precinct includes Turramurra Railway Station; the 1920s Rohini Street shops; the Gilroy Community Centre, Gilroy Street Heritage Conservation Area, Turramurra Lookout Community Garden, Hillview Conservation Area and much more.

FOKE proposes a new planning vision for Turramurra for the benefit of the future city of Sydney. Its wants Turramurra's development to be award winning, innovative and one that retains, enhances and celebrates its parkland charm, village character and architectural heritage.

Turramurra village is important to the heritage of Sydney. Turramurra presents an opportunity—just as the Rocks did when it was saved from demolition and high rise in the 1970s.

Turramurra village is a gift with its abundance of publically owned carparks that still retain their park-like character. At two formal public hearings, FOKE, along with other community groups, successfully rejected the reclassification of their public land for sale. It was argued that they were too important to lose. Many community owned council carparks offer opportunities to sympathetically revitalise local shopping villages and provide more open space. Once the land is in private ownership the community effectively loses control over what is built on it and how big and high it is.

It is now time for Ku-ring-gai Council and the NSW Government to listen to FOKE's vision.

Any great city ought to be able to boast an area such as Ku-ring-gai. In many cities of the world the values that are characteristic of Ku-ring-gai would be regarded as the things to be preserved.

These values are universal.

Timeline — Turramurra's Heritage & Planning

Pre The Kuring-gai people, known as the Terramerregal, were the original owners of the land of Turramurra. The word 'Turrramurra' is the Aboriginal word for 'big hill'. 1788 Turramurra's Timber Era—Land grants issued to free settlers who cut down the immense, 1820sancient forests of Turramurra. 1840s 1850s Turramurra's Orcharding Era—High rainfall and pockets of fertile soil produces a variety of citrus and other fruits. 'Boyd's Orchard' dates back to 1832 owned by Thomas Boyd. Land investment companies begin to purchase land to sell to middle class professionals for their 1880s family 'country' homes. 1890 Railway line opens from Hornsby and St Leonards. Rail line extended in 1893. Mr Ivan Auprince purchases land with house at Hillview. Yellowstone National Park—the first in the world—inspires Eccleston du Faur [1832-1915] to 1894 successfully advocate for Ku-ring-gai Chase to be Australia's second national park. 1895-'Ingleholme' in Boomerang Street, Turramurra is built for John Sulman [1849-1934] renowned 1896 architect and town planning visionary. First mention of 'Hillview' as a health resort. Leased to a series of women who ran it as a grand guest house. 1902 1907 'Hillview' purchased by E.W. Paul, who also purchases an additional ten blocks of land. E.S.W. Paul builds 2nd Federation house at 'Hillview'. In 1923 house converted into eight flats. 1913 Appearance of fruit fly and disease destroy remaining orchards. Growing demand for housing. 1920 Sydney Harbour Bridge opens. Views of Sydney Harbour Bridge can be seen from Pymble Hill. 1932 Annie Forsyth Wyatt, President of the Ku-ring-gai Tree Lovers' Civic League founds NSW National Trust—the first in Australia. Alderman Cresswell O'Reilly—also known as the 'Tree Mayor' of Ku-ring-gai is the founding President of the National Trust. 1945 Ku-ring-gai Council purchases 'Hillview' and leases it to the Health Commission. 1973 Hornsby & Ku-ring-gai Hospital purchase 'Hillview' with help from Rotary fundraising. 1980 Environmental Baseline Studies establish environmental sensitivity and limitations to Ku-ringgai's urban development. Ku-ring-gai Council's Draft Residential Strategy 2000 [Michael Harrison, Travis McEwan Group] acknowledges that "Ku-ring-gai exhibits environmental splendour of such a scale it is of national significance." NSW Government rejects Strategy. 2000 Ku-ring-gai's Medium Density Era - Local Environment Plan [LEP] 194 allows 5 storey apartments. 2004 First Independent Hearings into the reclassification of community lands held by Ku-ring-gai Council. Selling off publically owned carparks rejected by community. 2006 NSW Planning Minister Frank Sartor imposes external planning panel on Ku-ring-gai Council. 2008 Planning Panel to approve high-density development in Ku-ring-gai Town Centres. January NSW Planning Minister Tony Kelly announces 12-month extension of Ku-ring-gai Planning 2010 Panel who continue to make decisions on major developments rather than Ku-ring-gai Council. 2011 'Friends of Turramurra' win legal challenge to reject Ku-ring-gai Town Centre LEP —thanks to the support of the Environmental Defenders Office (NSW). Ku-ring-gai LEP (Local Centres) 2012 gazettes 5 storeys for Turramurra Town Centre. NSW Planning Minister Brad Hazzard overrides a recommendation for 2 storeys for 'Hillview' one of 2012 NSW's significant heritage sites and upzones it to 3 storeys that permits a roadway through the site.

Jackson-Stepowski's Peer Review recommends Heritage Conservation Area that includes 'Hillview'.
